Monday Night Net:

Thanks to so many of you for taking part in the Monday Night Net. This normally starts from 8pm on, as the name suggests, Monday. We typically have a dozen or more participants, and often hear from people off-air letting us know that they've been listening in. In case you've not heard (or joined) the net before, here's some information:

What is the Monday Night Net?

This was started by Pete MOPSX and Jim 2E0RMI in 2011. The net was originally run on a Thursday, and was intended to help out the new M6 Foundation licence holders. As you may recall from when you passed your first radio exam, making that first contact, or that first expensive purchase from the local emporium can be tricky, and it's helpful to get some friendly advice first.

Although the Net was intended to give the new M6s a chance to have a chat amongst friends, the Monday Night Net has grown into a meeting place for all amateurs in and around Essex. It's not uncommon for the Monday Night Net to get upwards of twenty people – some with days of experience, and some with decades. The net is welcome to all, so please give it a try!



Joining the Monday Night Net:

The net usually takes place on a Monday evening from 8pm local time on the Danbury Repeater, GB3DA. The Net has a moderator, who holds a list of participants and tries to let each person on the net talk in rotation, so that everyone knows when it's their turn to talk, and everyone gets a chance to have their say.

GB3DA details: Listen on 145.725MHz. Transmit on 145.125MHz with CTCSS of 110.9. Note that there is a 90 second timeout

Give it a try: eQSL

Do you eQSL? By Pete M0PSX

It seems that there's something of a marmite relationship with electronic QSLs – amateurs seem to either love eQSL, or hate it. It's easy to see why.




- The pros: Near-instant, semi-automatic sending and receiving of QSL cards. Oh, and it's free.
- The cons: eQSL cards are not valid for many contests, and there's something very tactile about opening that Bureau envelope and seeing a mix of actual paper cards.

It will come as no surprise that I'm in favour of eQSL, but that doesn't stop me enjoying the best of both worlds. As well as eQSL, I'm a regular user of the Bureau, and I also send and receive paper cards direct. I have both paper and electronic cards for some QSOs – it just so happens that I get one several months before the other. On this page, you'll find some eQSL basics and some handy tips.



New to eQSL?

The first thing to try, is a quick check to see if you have any waiting cards. You may be surprised! To check, go to www.essexham.co.uk and in the bar on the right-hand side, put your callsign into the "check QSL cards" box. The page that you get back will tell you if you're signed up to eQSL and how many cards are waiting. [Tip: you can check any callsign, not just your own!]



If you want to sign up, the process is free and doesn't take long. From www.eqsl.cc, you can be up-and-running by following the 'Register' option very quickly, and will then be able to view your waiting cards, as well as design and send your own cards.

What you need to know

eQSL.cc isn't the easiest site in the world to navigate your way around, and in this short article, I can't go into all of the finer points of using the service. Here are a few things of note that should help you get more out of using eQSL:

Inbox, Archive and Outbox: Get used to these yellow folders, as that's where your cards are stored. With each card, you'll have the option to accept or reject the card. By accepting, you'll automatically send an eQSL back to the person who sent the card. You can create a new card from your Outbox.



Designing your card. You do this via the postcard icon on the top menu. The choice is initially limited (which is way a lot of eQSL cards look alike). A donation of \$5 will get you upgraded to eQSL Bronze, meaning you can use your own photo, or a scan of your paper QSL card, for outgoing cards. Interestingly, if you update your card design, previous cards you've sent will also be updated!

Electronic Logs: If you log electronically, chances are you can send eQSLs automatically. If not, you can export your QSOs in the standard ADIF file format used by most logging packages, and import that file into eQSL. Easy!

Authenticity Guaranteed (AG): You'll be encouraged to certify your account. You can still use eQSL without doing this, but it means you can't get any awards, and your QSOs won't count towards other people's eQSL awards. You'll need to upload a photo or a scan of your licence, so that a volunteer can verify that you're you.



eQSL tips and tricks

Multiple accounts: If you have several callsigns, make sure you make use of the "My Accounts" feature on the eQSL.cc homepage. This lets you see all of your linked accounts, to see what's waiting for all your callsigns.

Slashes and Separations: The callsigns MOPSX, MOPSX/P, MOPSX/M and MOPSX/A are irritatingly all handled in eQSL as different callsigns, so if you work on-air using separators, you may have cards waiting for you that you don't know about. A handy tip here is to use the "Orphan eQSLs" option on the eQSL.cc homepage – This will list waiting cards for different variations of your call, and you'll need to "attach" an account for the different callsign to get to the waiting cards.

Awards: If you've been using eQSL for a while, you might find you're on your way to getting an eQSL award. The easiest one to get is likely to be the "I've worked 25 countries" award, which will give you an A4 printable certificate. There are plenty of other awards to go for, such as 300 prefixes and "worked all States".
